What's New at St. George's?



It is amazing what one can do with technology today. For a number of years we have had our own web page for St. George's. There is a wealth of information on our web page about what is happening at St. Georges. You can find this information by going to www.stgeorgesanglicantranscona.ca/ on the internet. We have recently set up an icon on the web page so that you can make a donation to St. George's right from your home computer or any computer throughout the world.

When you visit St. George's web page you will see the icon, **Donate Now through Canada Help.org**. You just follow the instructions and it is a very easy process. If you make a donation you **will receive a charitable tax donation receipt by e-mail immediately**. Also the funds will be automatically transferred to the church's operating account and the treasurer will also be notified of your monetary gift.



This allows individuals and parish members who are not able to attend on a regular basis to continue their support of our many missions in the community. It also allows you to make special donations at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas if you are away or unable to be at church on these special occasions. It also provides another avenue for you to donate in memory of loved ones if you cannot be at church or are unable to attend.

I have used this method a number of times and find it quite convenient, and it also allows me the opportunity to ensure that I can make a monetary donation when I am away or unable to be at church.

To dip or not to dip ... That is the question!

During a communion service, when the elements of bread and wine are offered to the community, there are many ways to receive them. Some hold out hands flat with head bowed to receive the bread while others look up at the priest as the words are being spoken. There is no 'correct' way. One of the beautiful things in the Anglican Church is the room we have to order our worship, tradition and style to suit the needs of its parishioners. That being said, we now move on to a health lesson.

I am quite sure that most of you are aware of the H1N1 flu pandemic that has been hovering around us for a while; it used to be called 'swine flu' because swine are also susceptible to this virus. This is not a new problem. 1918 was the first 'swine flu' outbreak, and it has been around since then in the hog industry. It is raising its head again and everybody is being asked to take precautions to prevent the spread of this virus. One of the ways that any kind of virus is spread is by passing from one to another through touch. This particular virus is a tough one which hangs around even on hard, dry surfaces, though it is destroyed by sanitisation, such as hand sanitisers or alcohol.

Health and communion may only seem related in a spiritual sense; it is a commonly known fact that a healthy spiritual life often results in a longer, healthier bodily life. However, there are concerns that when we share in the common cup we are sharing our viruses, too, so people choose to take their bread or wafer and dip it into the wine rather than to drink from the cup. This practice is called intinction. It is a common catholic practice where the priest takes the wafer, intincts and places it on the tongue of the communicant. It is an approved method of administration. This method was adapted by some, in that when offered the cup, they dip the bread themselves. This is where the problem occurs. Our hands are one of the places where viruses hang out, and if we touch the wine at all, we contaminate all of the wine. It is then distributed to others, and we share more than a spiritual moment together after that!

To drink from the common cup poses less of a risk for cross contamination because our mouths are 'cleaner' than our hands. Also, the rim of the cup is cleaned between each person, and the alcohol content of the wine is quite high as a measure to prevent spread of such viruses. At St. George's we will be bringing in a different option for our congregation. We are purchasing a communion tray with small glass cups that hold a measure of wine.



This tray with wine will be consecrated along with the other common cup wine during the Eucharistic Prayer. So after taking the bread, the option will be to either drink from the common cup or take a single measure of consecrated wine, or not to take the wine at all. All of these options are suitable, and all are recognised as fully receiving Christ into yourself. As soon as the trays arrive, this practice will begin.

So to answer the question...To Dip or Not to Dip....the answer is NOT TO DIP!

Please feel free to talk with me about this if you have any other concerns.

Garden Centre 2009


It is a pleasure to report to our parish family that our 2009 Garden Centre endeavor succeeded despite a major challenge due to the weather. The month of May was very rainy with cool weather which had a very negative effect on plant sales - the lowest in the past nine years as we were closed many days due to the cool wet weather and the threat of frost. The weather turned nice in June and we did 80% of our sales in the next 2 ½ weeks. We were very busy during this time and sales were very brisk.

The sale of soil continues to be a major contributor to our bottom line. This year we had to pay for our shovellers as we had very few volunteers. This is the only way we can meet the demand for bagged soil by our customers. We paid 14 baggers who worked a total of 204 hours. The cost to bag 120 yards amounted to \$1838 this year. This has had a negative impact on our bottom line; however, if we didn't do this our bottom line would be impacted very seriously. I would like to thank Carol Ann Matthew who ensured that we had the soil bagged. Without her help co-ordinating and arranging for shovellers our sale of soil would have been greatly reduced.

The Garden Centre has become a place to share in some fun and experience the outreach and fellowship that takes place over the seven weeks. There is a core group whom you can count on to ensure the operation is a success. The parish needs to be appreciative of this group, whose stewardship ensures the Garden Centre was operational at all times. They were there through all types of weather and endured some taxing times when it was extremely busy. It becomes hectic when plants are delivered and need to be put away. Extra hands are always needed for this and also in the caring and watering of plants, especially when the weather turns warm.

Firstly, I would like to thank everyone who contributed to another successful venture. To volunteer so much of your time in May and June when the weather was so good was greatly appreciated. The parish thanks the set-up and take-down crews, the volunteer sales staff, the shift scheduler, individual baggers, those looking after the finances and people delivering soil this year. Their efforts were greatly appreciated.

We were very fortunate to have Liz Krupa, our summer student, return for another year. Without this kind of help it would be almost impossible to carry on with the plant stand open on a seven days a week. Again this year we fortunate to receive a grant to cover



a large portion of our summer student's salary.

At this time we have transferred approximately \$10,000 to the parish general account which is down \$3000 from last year (2008). Heather Petura is preparing a detailed financial report that will be included in the annual report with the finalized numbers for this year's operation. I would like to thank Heather for ensuring that the financial results of the Garden Centre are recorded properly in the financial statements she prepares, which are disclosed to the parish.

The garden centre accounts for about 10% of revenue generated to operate our parish which is a considerable amount of money. It is critical that you seriously consider volunteering some of your time to this project for the upcoming year as we rely on this source of revenue for the continued operation of our parish.

We closed with a BBQ at the church which was well attended with some great food to enjoy. This was certainly a positive way to wind up our activities for the year.

I announced at the windup that 2009 would be my last year for coordinating the Garden Centre. The vestry will be looking for someone to step forward to manage this major fund raising project. I will be able to assist this person; however, I am not in a position to volunteer and give of my personal time as I have done in the past.

Again I would like to thank everyone who worked this year at the Garden Centre. Your effort and devotion to this project contributes to the continuous success of our parish family of St. George's.

St. George's Christmas Bazaar


